Thank you for this opportunity to provide written testimony on House Bill 1938. My name is Mary Meinig and I am the Director of the Office of the Family & Children's Ombudsman ("OFCO").

HB 1938 recognizes the importance of the sibling relationship between children and acknowledges that for children who have been removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect, a sibling may have been a critical source of love and support that was otherwise lacking in their home of origin. We support the bill's directive to the court and parties to an open adoption agreement to consider the long-term benefits of maintaining post-adoption contact between siblings. We want adoption to be a winning situation for children—gaining a permanent family, rather than the loss of a sibling to whom they are attached.

We think it is important that the adoptive family weigh the feasibility and practicality of continued contact between siblings. If it is found by the parties to be mutually beneficial, it is our hope that maintaining contact between siblings post-adoption will become a more common practice. At a minimum, HB 1938 ensures that this rewarding possibility does not fall by the wayside merely due to oversight.
